SPRING BIRD COUNT-1992

Only thirteen localities were sampled on the 1992 Spring Bird Count. This low turnout is not surprising, because the count has not been published in several years. Coverage was especially sparse in South Carolina (only one count), and on the coast (also only one count). The 1992 Spring Count was largely restricted to the North Carolina Piedmont, with eight censuses being made in that region. Indeed, the Triangle and Triad areas accounted for six counts, almost half. Perhaps, publication in The Chat again will bring about renewed interest in the Spring Count, and the submittal of reports from new areas in the future.

Not surprisingly, the total species list was low, only 229. Specifically, this low total can be largely attributed to poor coverage in South Carolina and along the coast. Actually, the total list of land birds was not much below average. Wilmington, with 161 species, led all counts. Inland, Jordan Reservoir and Winston-Salem had quite respectable totals of 145 and 143, respectively.

Details fro numerous rare and tardy species were inadequate, and, unfortunately, three very rare/extremely rare species had to be deleted because of inadequate details. Please note, if a bird is considered to be rare, then it must be described. A mere statement that a bird was seen by John and Jane Dole does not represent a description. It should be stressed that providing adequate details does not necessarily entail a laborious undertaking for the compiler; many marginally rare species can be adequately detailed with just two or three lines. However, the description must rule out all other species. For extremely rare species, especially ones that are similar to more common species, a page of details may be needed to adequately document the record. Compilers are especially challenged to adequately document late Purple finches; I suspect that some of the reported "Purple Finches" are actually House Finches.

Because of the overall poor documentation, and lack of compiler's comments, few compiler's appear in the comments section of the 1992 Spring Count. Of course, the poor level of documentation is understandable, in that the count has not been published in a decade. With the re-publication of the Spring Count, we are asking that compilers do a better job of documenting rare sightings. We also urge that compilers provide other comments, e.g. descriptions of how changes in land use have affected their count circles, and descriptions of some of the more striking changes in bird life in their areas over the years.

With the first publication of the Spring Count in a decade, it is indeed interesting to look through the count table, and note some changes in numbers that have occurred for many species during the last ten to fifteen years or so. Some of the counts that really stand out are listed here:

Double-crested Cormorant. This species is much more common on North Carolina Piedmont counts than formerly.

Canada Goose. Geese were recorded on every count, much in contrast to former years. Undoubtedly these are birds established from feral populations.

Bald Eagle. This species represents a real success story for the last decade. The total of eighteen birds contrasts sharply with a decade ago; not one eagle was found on the 1982 Spring Bird Count.

- Cooper's Hawk. This bird continues to slowly increase as a resident species. On this year's count, more Cooper's (18) were found than sharpies. Formerly, I would have dismissed this sort of ratio as being the result of misidentifications, but no more. Several observers now comment about how it is increasingly easy to find Cooper's Hawks on Christmas Counts.
- Wild Turkey. Seven birds were found on three counts. Might the day come when turkeys are easier to come by than Northern Bobwhites?!
- Northern Bobwhite. Even considering that only thirteen counts were made, the total of 185 individuals is quite dismal. A few localities had only single-digit counts, and Wilmington had but a single bird.
- American Coot. Only five were tallied, a notably low figure compared to onetwo decades ago. Was the productivity of the Piedmont's reservoirs largely a temporary phenomenon?
- American Woodcock. A total of only four individuals was found. Let's hope that this decrease is a least in part cyclical.
- Common Snipe. Surprisingly, the total count of this species (ten) was also rather dismal.
- Ring-billed Gull. A total of 631 was found in the North Carolina Piedmont. The region's reservoirs are perhaps important primarily as sites for roosting.
- Barn Owl. None were reported on any of the counts. Many active field observers have commented on the increasing degree of difficulty of finding the species, even in the winter. Some suggest that an increase in Great Horned Owl populations is at least part of the problem.
- Chuck-will's-widow and Whip-poor-will. Notably low totals, 44 and 94 respectively, were recorded for both species, which are undoubtedly losing habitat as rural areas are transformed to suburbia. Notably, on the Wilmington count, more Whip-poor-wills were tallied than Chuck-will's-widows. Twenty years ago, that situation would have been considered laughable.
- Loggerhead Shrike. Eighteen individuals were found on the North Carolina counts. Taking the low number of reports into consideration, this total is roughly comparable to totals of a decade ago. Many feel that this species has now leveled off across most of the state, and may even be increasing slightly at a few localities.
- Bachman's Sparrow. Only four individuals of this Federal candidate species were found, not surprising in that most reports were from the North Carolina Piedmont. However, only two individuals were reported form Wilmington.
- Winter finches. As one active birder now says, "What are they?" No Evening Grosbeaks were found, and the only Pine Siskins were in the mountains. Perhaps several of the reported Purple Finches were actually House Finches. Of course, the numbers of winter finches have always gone up and down from year to year. Nowadays though, they stay down.
- House finch. They just get more and more common. Six birds were found on the coast at Wilmington, and, in North Carolina, House Finches are now breeding almost everywhere.
- House Sparrow. Although few would be interested, less than a thousand individuals of this species were tallied. In fact, the total count of House Finches was almost as high as the total count of House Sparrows, a ratio that most of us that live in urban and suburban areas would not find surprising.

They saw the Purple Sandpipers on the jetty at the inlet, the Piping Plover on Masonboro Island. Hardwick saw the Merlin and both saw the Peregrine Falcon at close range near a dredge island. Both saw the Bald Eagle near Orton. They also saw the Vesper Sparrow on one of the dredge islands.

Greg Massey and Jeremy Nance saw the Great Cormorants at Masonboro Inlet late in the afternoon.

Kitty and Angela Kosh saw the female Rose-breasted Grosbeak and the Canada Warbler in Bellview Cemetery (17th & Princes Place Dr., several blocks from Oakdale.) about noon. Both species responded to a Screech-Owl tape. The yellow spectacles, yellow throat, breast and belly and black necklace on the breast were seen at about 25 feet at eye level for about 2 min on the Canada Warbler.

Compiler's comments: Historically, when the calendar grants Durham a later count day, we get a much better showing of migrants and passerines. This year was no exception, as we turned in one of the best counts ever for these birds. Twenty-three species of warblers (topped by Kent Fiala's Wilson's Warbler, our first since 1974!) highlights one of the nicest lists of passerines ever found on a Durham count. Birds associated with the water, however, were another story. Falls Lake continues to be disappointing. Duck and shorebird numbers were dismal, more like pre-lake days than the record counts of the 80's. We have not seen a single diving bird (except cormorants) in three years, and even the ever increasing Ring-billed Gulls were in lower numbers than we have seen in years. Wood Ducks seem to be the only species benefiting from the lake, (and nest boxes). 46 was a new high count.

Two species were added to the list for the first time this spring. After many near misses, and stake-outs that wouldn't show up on count Day, Wild Turkeys joined us with a vengeance, four individuals were reported by three different parties! The other new bird came from Steve Graves, Doug Shadwick, and C.J. Nelson who watched a Black-billed Cuckoo, in their scope, eating caterpillars, for five minutes.
