SPRING BIRD COUNT — 1994

PEGGY V. FEREBEE

We had 13 locations participate in the 1994 Spring Bird Count, down from 17 last year. A number of last year's respondents participated in the National Migratory Bird Count Day and found it difficult to hold two counts so close together. The area covered by this year's count is still predominantly in the Piedmont section of North Carolina. There were two North Carolina counts from the foothills and no coastal counts. Only three of the 13 counts were from South Carolina, two coastal, one inland. We really need more areas covered.

I would like to thank those complier's who took time to submit comments. I am sure there is a great deal of discussion at each countdown concerning that count's results. I would like to have more of this submitted. What do you think is affecting the birds in your area? It is habitat change, are you loosing veteran observers, was the weather really strange? This is the kind of information that is just as valuable as numbers and the compilers are the ones who can submit it. Also document unusual or rare birds or I may be forced to delete the report. Be sure to explain why it is <u>not</u> a more common similar species.

The decrease in number of count areas is reflected in the count totals. While we actually had more species reported (239 versus 226 last year), the number of individuals seen was down (74930 versus 86409 last year). Observers put in a total of 1152 hours, as compared to 1224.5 hours last year. Generally the weather was good, with a little early rain in a few counts. The temperature was seasonal. One compiler suggested that the warm weather preceding the count may have decreased the number of winter and transient migrants they saw in their area.

Generalizing about avian population trends can be difficult when dealing with a short time span. However, in looking back over the 1992 summary and the 1993 count and comparing it to the 1994 results, some observations can be made.

Double-crested Cormorants continue to be perfectly comfortable inland, appearing in all counts. Ring-billed Gulls continue to increase inland as well. Fish Crows appeared everywhere except the foothill regions. Loggerhead Shrikes showed an increase again, from 45 in 1992, 74 in 1993 to 92 in 1994. We did see some winter finches this count, with Evening Grosbeaks showing up at Jordan Lake and 5 counts with Pine Siskins. Only two counts reported Purple Finches, which I hope means observers are being careful to differentiate between Purple and House Finches. Unfortunately that also means that House Finches continue to be more common while Purple Finches become rarer. Bachman's Sparrow was found in an additional count area, bringing the total to three.

There were some notable decreases. Eastern Phoebes were down. A mere 25 Ruby-crowned Kinglets were seen as opposed to 125 last year. Last year 258 Ruby-throated Hummingbirds were reported, but only 128 were seen this year. That supports the complaints I received all summer from folks who wanted to know where their hummingbirds were! Unfortunately, all the vireos but Redeyed showed a decrease. The number of warbler species reported stayed the same, but the number of individuals was down considerably, 8304 individuals

reported last year as compared to 5868 this year. Part of this decrease is due to fewer count areas being reported this year. But in 1992, with the same number of counts and fewer total field hours, 7257 individuals were reported. We're seeing fewer birds. House Sparrows continue to decline, which won't disappoint a lot of people. Despite their name, House Sparrows are birds that do better in rural areas and that habitat is declining in many count areas. Eagles also seemed to be down, in areas where they have been reported in the past but there is a bright note here. Greensboro reported a pair which successfully hatched a chick this spring and seem to be raising it successfully. This represents a new nesting area for this species.

Compiler's comments: The Common Merganser, which is uncommon in Pitt County during the winter, appeared similar to first spring male as illustrated in the National Geographic Society field guide.

Compiler's comments: Alder Flycatcher may represent first record for area. Seen by Charlotte Gantz (who is familiar with species) and party near Lakeview, in the edge of a black gum swamp. It was identified by its "fee-bee-o" song.

Compiler's comments: The center of the count circle was moved about 2 3/4 miles to the north of the former circle. This move was made primarily to include two large ponds southeast of the town of Angier. It is hoped that this will get more waterfowl on the Christmas Bird Count. The number of species seen was slightly up from 1993, although the number of individuals seen was slightly lower. The Anhinga was seen by Scott Hartley and Dick Holbrook at a farm pond on the southwest side of the circle and represents a first for this count. For a second year in a row, a Swainson's Warbler was seen, the third record of this bird for this count. The bird was seen by Larry Rose and Bobby Lutfy. The Least Sandpipers were seen feeding at a drained lagoon at the Lillington Wastewater Treatment Plant. An encouraging 14 Loggerhead Shrikes were tallied. It hasn't been too long ago that we really had to "beat the bushes" to find a shrike. Let's hope the trend continues. Paul Hart and David Brown had King Rails respond to a taped call in the same location they were found in 1992. The birds were not seen. Later in that day, ironically, they found a roadkilled King Rail about a mile from the aforementioned location. Mary Stevens had two slightly late Pine Siskins still at her feeder, as well as two Northern Orioles still feeding on peanut butter mix.

Compiler's comments: Temperatures in the 80's and southerly winds for five or six days prior to the count day apparently was responsible for the lack of lingering winter residents and also for the comparatively small numbers of transient migrants, especially transient warblers and thrushes. Among the more unusual finds were an American Bittern heard calling, a female Hooded Merganser (probably breeding), a King Rail, two adult and two young Barred Owls at a nest, and a male Cerulean Warbler.

Compiler's comments: This was a rather lackluster count, with fewer species than we have had since the first year of this count (1977). This year we saw no loons or grebes, few Black Vultures, only two Bald Eagles, and no sandpipers or plovers other than Killdeer, Woodcock, and Spotted and Solitary Sandpipers. There were no tern species. The number of Yellow-billed Cuckoos was down. We had no Great Horned Owls for the very first time. There were fewer Barn Swallows and Purple Matins than usual. No Swainson's Thrush or Veery were heard, although they are in my yard as of May 18. The number of Starlings, Grackles and Yellow-rumped Warblers were also down. Our total warbler species was at a near low of 20. For the first time we had no Bobolinks. The Eastern Bluebirds and Blue-grey Gnatcatchers are doing well and there is quite an increase in the number of Canada Geese and Fish Crows.

This count circle is an area of continual change. Bulldozing for the lake commenced in 1977, when the count began. Since then the area has gone through a prairie grass stage (before impoundment) which encouraged such species such as the Short-eared Owl, Northern Harrier and Dickcissels. As the

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lake filled, surounding farm lands began a normal succession which is now in the pine forest stage. At the southeast edge, Shearon Harris nuclear plant was developed. This included Harris Lake, part of which is in our circle but difficult to access. Many bedroom communities have been and are being developed on some of this land, hence the nature of our bird life is gradually changing. This could be better monitored by frequent breeding bird censuses rather than spring counts, but we do get some appreciation for the change. Also worth mentioning is a huge new "wilderness" camping area and boat ramps which has just been opened by State Parks this spring, with new unfamiliar topography.

This year's count was also affected by the absence of several of our ace party leaders who had been counting the same areas over a period of years and hence knew exactly what to expect. Even though we did have competent party leaders in all 19 areas covered, many were totally unfamiliar with them (especially such areas as the new "wilderness" campground area, where a highly competent party walked at least 6 miles without seeing anything of note except a Wild Turkey, which of course was a very worthwhile observation).

However, there were some bright spots quite worthy of note. We have had a small colony of Bachman's Sparrows in a clearcut area at the bottom of our count circle for several years now but did not expect this to last, since new pines spring up so very fast. However, Terry Logue found an ideal spot, where at least a half dozen Bachman's Sparrows were singing on territory, and he actually observed a pair copulating. (A map and report was included)

Our party was fortunate in finding a female Western Tanager, also near the south end of the circle. The bird was very well observed by three of us. We all remarked on the wing bars which are the trademark of this species. (A report was included).

A third bird worthy of note may be a partial albino. One wonders of it could conceivably be a hybrid sparrow. Claudia Eglehoff submitted two drawings, made by herself and another party member. The bird resembles a Chipping Sparrow, with a bold white forehead and white throat, and bright rusty crown. It apparently was a very striking bird. She noted "a little larger than a Chipping Sparrow" but evidently did not have a direct comparison at hand. The bird walked, rather than hopped. Does a Chipping Sparrow walk? I don't know. They usually are not situated in a location where they might be walking. So I submit this for someone more knowledgeable than I. It is called "Sparrow Species" on our report.

Compiler's comments: In spite of expressed concerns about a late count date this year's count is one of the best we have had in several years. The weather cooperated and we seem to have struck it lucky in terms of migrating populations.

The Red-necked Grebe was reported by Henry Link and I presume that this is the bird that was hanging around Lake Brandt. Herb Hendrickson reported the Caspian Tern and the Great Cormorant. Lynn Moseley's group reported the Ruby-crowned Kinglet. Jean McCoy's group reported the Little Blue Heron. Jim Mattocks reported the Bobolink from the airport area. He and another member of his party devoted a good bit of scope time to identifying this bird as a female Bobolink. John Schoonover's party reported the Rusty Blackbird. A pair of Bald Eagles have been monitored at Lake Higgins, one of the city reservoirs, since their appearance in the area in Januarry and in April they successfully hatched a chick.

Compiler's comments: The Fish Crow was sighted at the Forsyth County Landfill by a party composed of Bill and Susan Hammond, Cynthia Donalson, Paul Decker, Jake Kaplan, Jessica Kaplan, and myself. American Crows were in the area. The Fish Crow was foraging with Starlings and Grackles and its dimensions as a small crow were readily comparable to the smaller birds it was associating with. However, the determination of this bird as a Fish Crow was not made until it was plainly heard to call. It was joined within two to three minutes by three others. This is the second record of Fish Crows for the landfill on a Spring Count The first was made by Susan Hammond, Cynthia Donaldson, Todd Buchannon and myself of 1 May, 1993.
